# CODES OF PRACTICE FOR THE CARE AND HANDLING OF FARM ANIMALS

Revisions to the Codes of Practice for beef cattle, mink, ranched fox, pigs and equine began in October. Each Code revision team is comprised of two committees:

- A Code Development Committee members represent the interests of their respective organizations, collaborate with other committee members and contribute to the development of the Code. Committee members include producers (from each production phase), transporters, veterinarians, animal welfare representatives, regulatory enforcement representatives, processors, governments, researcher/ academia and technical expertise. They provide species-specific expertise and experience.
- A Scientists' Committee members review and develop a report that synthesizes
  the results of research relating to key animal welfare issues. Committee members
  are specialists in research on the care and management of the farm animal under
  consideration. The Code Development Committee uses the report in drafting the
  Code. National veterinary and research organizations make recommendations to
  NFACC as to the appropriate expertise on the Scientists' Committee.

Committee members are selected in accordance with NFACC's Code Development Process guideline document. Visit www.nfacc.ca for more details on the guidelines.



## NATIONAL FARM ANIMAL CARE CONFERENCE • OCT 5-6, 2011

Plan now to attend the National Farm Animal Care Conference at the Hilton Garden Inn, Ottawa, ON. The on-site registration begins at noon on Wednesday, October 5 for this one and half day conference.

The theme is Advancing Animal Care and Addressing Market Expectations. The conference will:

- 1) Highlight Canadian Code development and assessment/product assurance processes including benchmarking results and activities around the world that may impact upon them.
- 2) Raise awareness of domestic and international market directions related to animal welfare.
- 3) Showcase commodities that have or are in the process of revising their Codes.

- 1) Build relationships and share information with groups that have diverse interests in animal welfare
- 2) Stay current of new initiatives and be prepared for future challenges
- 3) Enhance their awareness of the inherent complexities of animal welfare

The conference will be of interest to all those involved in the animal agriculture industry – producers, farm animal and processor associations, retail, restaurant and food service companies, government and animal protection/enforcement agencies, veterinarians, researchers and media. ## ASSESSMENT AND PRODUCT ASSURANCE

An Animal Care Assessment Model Steering Committee has been organized and Terms of Reference developed. A first teleconference is planned for March. The Steering Committee will provide active guidance for the finalization of NFACC's draft Animal Care Assessment Model (ACAM), which will include hosting two workshops.
